President's Letter

Sense of Community & Volunteers Needed!

I am an only child and for the last couple of years have been responsible for the care of my 92-year-old disabled father who lives in Northern PA way out in the country by himself with a dog. I will be eternally grateful to his extensive network of neighbors and friends. Not a day goes by it seems that someone doesn't stop by with a container of homemade soup or a pizza or just to say hello. There is a lady that often walks her dog past his house and will stop and grab my father's dog to walk with her so he gets his exercise. But there are also those who are just "checking in."

As president of the SLCA, I have had elderly people reach out to me to ask for assistance with neighborhood issues such as solving drainage problems or trying to contact the appropriate local government agency to resolve something. It is at these times that it makes me think of my dad and how what might seem so simple to us can be a big challenge to someone who cannot simply upload, download, email, or "text it to me." You know "just take a picture of it on your phone and send it to me" type stuff. My father was born before a computer was even a thought. He is a very bright man but used to functioning in a very different way.

I have heard some say that they prefer to get their information through social media, such as Facebook or Nextdoor. Of course, those sites do have their value and offer a network to neighborhoods. But doesn't "just checking in" have its place as well?

I recently read an article about the importance of community, whether you define that as your work place, where you live, or even the people in your yoga class. It stated that it is the life blood of our well-being and that it can improve one's overall health and even boost your immune system. The article went on to say that as families become more and more spread out, we rely more on communicating with others where we live. Also, by contributing to your community and lending a helping hand, it provides great benefits to you even by just making you happier overall. I go to a local assisted living facility 2 times a month and just sit and play the piano for the residents. I can honestly say that I am benefitting much more from going there than the people that I play for are.

One of the goals of the SLCA right now is to recruit new block captains for blocks that are missing them and to revamp the way that the system of block captains is structured. I believe that block captains are critical to the success of the SLCA and to the well-being of our neighborhood not just because they help in our membership drive, but more importantly as they are a very powerful means of communication in Stratford Landing particularly for our elderly residents. REPORT FROM MVCCA Environment & Recreation

The MVCCA Environment and Recreation (E&R) Committee heard a presentation from County staff working on the stream restoration of Quander Brook, which runs through the Fairchild property, behind Chuck E. Cheese on Route 1. This stream has been terribly damaged and eroded from massive storm water runoff from the parking lots and Route One. The County is currently nearing completion of the design phase, and plans to install step pools and raise the streambed to slow down the runoff and restore the stream (and protect the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay from sediment being scoured from the streambed). The area will be replanted in native trees and shrubs. Once the stream restoration is complete, the Board of Supervisors will turn the property over to the Fairfax County Park Authority, and it will become a park. Recently, land was obtained from the Quander family to provide access to the park from Quander Road. This area is of historical and archaeological significance. Indian artifacts from the archaic and Woodland periods have been found on the Fairchild property. Vermont troops camped there during the civil war, and Union horses were watered at the original Spring Bank, the valley wall that dripped with springs and was covered with ferns.

If you're a glutton for punishment, join Senator Scott Surovell and the Surovolunteers the week before as well, to clean up the trashiest section of the creek (and the trashiest stretch of stream in Fairfax County) on April 7. REPORT FROM MVCCA Public Safety

Assistant Fire Chief John Caussin of the Fairfax County Fire and Rescue Department (FRD) presented to the MVCCA Public Safety committee. Chief Caussin oversees the Business Services Bureau and the Office of the Fire Marshal so he was one of the best people to provide an overview of the proposed FY2019 budget. The FY 2019 advertised budget has \$209.4 million dollars allocated for the FRD of which 74 percent will be used for staffing.

• Fire and Rescue responded to 101,000 calls last year. About 73 percent of the calls were for emergency medical services and 25 percent were for fires, with the balance involving hazardous materials, technical rescue and other events.

• Operations personnel work a 56-hour work week which is comprised of 24-hour shifts. Staff work on a day, off a day, on a day, off a day, on a day and then off four days. The other departments in Northern Virginia work the same shift,

but Washington, DC and Prince Georges County, Maryland work a 42-hour work week. Fire and Rescue currently has a number of capital improvement projects here in the Mount Vernon District including rebuilding the fire stations at Lorton, Woodlawn and Penn Daw. These projects will occur over the next several years with completion dates in 2023.
