Do you feel disheartened by recent frightening news about climate change and environmental setbacks? If so, here's an antidote to despair: focus on making your own backyard a positive force for environmental good and provide an oasis for birds and wildlife. away from power lines and utilities.

- Remove invasive vines from your yard, especially from trees. English ivy, Wintercreeper, Japanese honeysuckle, and other non-native invasive species do a lot of environmental harm. They overwhelm and displace native plants and trees, killing them. When they climb a tree, they cause disease and the weight creates a hazard tree, vulnerable to being brought down by wind. Ivy harbors the mice that carry Lyme disease.
- Learn more about how to attract and support birds, bees, butterflies and other beneficial wildlife in your yard. Visit http://audubonva.org/wildlife-sanctuaryprogram/ to request a free visit from an Audubon at Home Ambassador, who can advise on native plantings and other ways to create habitat in your own back yard. You can even get certified as a Wildlife Sanctuary, with a nice yard sign.

MVCCA Planning & Zoning

The Committee heard from the Wesley Housing attorney and its Senior Project Manager to put forward a second development option for their property to be sited at the southeast intersection of Huntington Ave and Biscayne Dr. The property is approximately 1.04 acres and is currently occupied with two sets of duplex dwelling units and a 3-story garden apartment building.

The applicant is proposing 126 multifamily units (studio, 1 bedroom & 2 bedroom rentals), 7,500 sq. feet of office spaces, and 179 parking spaces; 35% of the property would be open space.

The concerns of the P&Z Committee were additional affordable housing within the Mt. Vernon District where there is already an abundance of affordable housing. The Wesley Housing representatives will reach out to the MVCCA Transportation, Environment & Recreation Committees and will return to the Planning & Zoning Committee.

Whole Blood Donation Explained

This is the most common type of donation received from our donors. The entire process takes about an hour and includes four simple steps:

- 1. Complete a Donor Health Questionnaire
- 2. **Mini-Physical Health Screening** One of our trained staff members will take your temperature, measure your blood pressure, measure your hemoglobin (iron) levels and ask questions about your form and answer any questions you have.
- The Donation This part typically takes less than 15 minutes. Insider Tip: The donation will go faster if you are hydrated! Insider Tip
 Please eat before you donate. There is no need to fast.
- 4. **Refreshments** We ask that you stay about 15 minutes and have some delicious snacks in our canteen area before leaving our facility.

A whole blood donation includes four components including:

- Red Blood Cells
- Platelets
- Plasma
- White Blood Cells

After your generous blood donation is received, it travels to our testing facility where the white blood cells are removed and the remaining components are separated into units of red blood cells, platelets and plasma. When a patient needs a transfusion, doctors typically prescribe platelets OR red cells OR plasma, which is why it is critical for the blood to be divided into the components before being shipped to patients in need. Each time you donate whole blood you can help save up to THREE lives.

Did you know? Fairfax County Leash Laws

There have been several posts on NextDoor in the past few months about dog attacks and unleashed pets. In light of that, we thought now may be a good time to post an abbreviated version of the Fairfax County law. The full version can be found on Fairfax County's website.

Section 41.1-2-4. Unrestricted dogs prohibited; leash law

(a) No dog shall run unrestricted, as defined in Section 41.1-1-1, in the County. This Section shall not apply to any person who uses a dog under his direct supervision while lawfully hunting, while engaged in a supervised formal obedience training class or show, during formally sanctioned field trials, while a dog is in an area owned, leased, controlled, or operated by Fairfax County designated by resolution of the Board of Supervisors as an off-leash dog exercise area, or while a dog is in an area owned, leased, controlled, or operated by the Fairfax County Park Authority and designated by resolution of the Fairfax County Park Authority as an off-leash or dog exercise area, or while a dog is in an area, leased, controlled, or operated by the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority and designated by resolution of the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority Board as an off-leash or dog exercise area, or if a dog is a service animal whose handler is unable because of a disability to use a harness, leash, or other tether, or the use of a harness, leash, or other tether would interfere with the service animal's safe effective performance of work or tasks, in which case the service animal must be otherwise under the handler's control (e.g., voice control, signals, or other effective means). It is a violation of this Section for any owner of a dog to place such dog or allow it to be placed into custody of any person not physically capable of maintaining effective control of restricting such dog.
