Little Hunting Creek Sewer Line Replacement

The County will replace a sewer line running underneath Little Hunting Creek because it is sagging, posing environmental risks and causing high maintenance costs. Permits for the project were delayed due to the government shutdown last January, and there were delays in obtaining needed easements. The project is now on track to be bid in late 2019 or early 2020. Traffic on Stockton Parkway east of Waterford will be restricted (probably for a couple of weeks) while pipes underneath the street connecting to the sewer line are replaced, and will be restricted to one lane during the construction project.

Rule Change for Curbside Recycling

As of October 1, the county no longer accepts glass in curbside recycling containers. Glass breaks and contaminates other valuable recyclables (such as cardboard and metal) and reduces their value, and it damages machinery. Instead, bring your glass bottles and jars (no light bulbs, mirrors, windows, or sheet glass) to one of the 21 purple dumpsters located around the county, including one at the Mount Vernon Government Center on Parkers Lane. (You can also throw your glass in the trash, but please recycle instead.) The county has procured a glass crusher, and other local jurisdictions are sending their glass to it, too. The crushed glass is used in county construction projects.

County Efforts on Litter Control

The county has begun a 4 month Litter Removal Pilot Project. The program provides part-time, temporary work to guests of county shelters. Participants earn \$10 an hour to pick up litter in and around streams and to remove invasive plants. This project is a win-win--it helps improve water quality in streams as well as provide dignity in work to people experiencing homelessness. The team of up to 10 people is out working every weekday so they can get through a lot of trash. In fact, the county is running out of sites to clean up! The county has requested help from the Friends of Little Hunting Creek and other friends groups to identify "high value" trash sites. We visited a couple of the trashier sites we clean up every year on Little Hunting Creek (near Janna Lee Avenue bridge, and at Shaw Park Court), and they were cleaner than we've ever seen them. The county crew had clearly just picked up the Shaw Park Court site, because there was a big pile of bags and debris. Trash Trap

The county is installing a trash trap on Little Hunting Creek behind the Hybla Valley mall. This project has been in the works forever, but we hope it will finally be operating in the next few months—and that we'll see less trash floating down the creek as a result.

The next Little Hunting Creek cleanup is March 28, 2020. Save the date, details to follow.
