
Please DON'T Light Up the Night Leah Chapla, Contributor

In walking or driving around Stratford Landing (or other neighborhoods in the area) at night you may think that many people believe that bright outdoor lighting protects their properties from the proverbial and elusive burglars. Actually, FBI data says that most break-ins occur during the day between 10 am and 3 pm. And LED spotlights and porch lights which emit white light are not only unpleasantly bright for neighboring homes but are damaging to birds and predators that migrate or hunt at night, fatal to insects that are drawn to artificial light (which negatively affects species that rely on insects for food) and even make it easier for the criminal to see his way around.

If you use outdoor lighting, please be sure to use yellow or red bulbs and make sure your lights face down, rather than out toward your neighbors. And consider switching to motion-detector lighting which has the added benefit of saving energy.

THE STRATFORD POOL

It all began in the summer of 1965 A house to house canvas started the drive. The Community Pool now was beginning to jell So out we went with 400 memberships to sell.

Negotiations had been concluded for a 5.75 acre plot Plus a contract for pool construction on this lot. Construction was to start later that fall So that next summer, members could have a ball.

The 400 family membership drive began and through diligent effort proceeded according to plan. And thanks to the early joiners of this drive The Stratford Community Pool was kept alive.

The construction began and the opening date was set An abundance of memberships and funds were met. On August 14, 1965, the kids made a mad dash And the Stratford Pool opened with a resounding splash.

The initial facilities were now complete, An olympic size "Z" shaped pool to beat the heat. A large bath house to change in and shower And a pool for tots to wade in and cower.

The 1967 swim season we did meet The our membership was still not complete. Improvements and needs were taken in hand To enhance the swim area and land.

The 1968 season was one for us to yell for the 400th membership we did sell. This plus improvements and a new swim team Brought to reality the 1965 Stratford Pool dream.

Plans for the 1969 season are in the mill With further grading and seeding of land and hill. Work on the parking lot and entrance way Undartable to be completed on opening day.

Tennis court construction plans have already begun Boring for compaction tests have been run. Hore swim party dates have been set aside this year For adults, teems, tots, and their guests, far and near

The swim team ranks this year will swell and like last year, will do very well. Plans for a diving team are in high gear and we have for a good turnout this year.

Now those things were able to come to pass Because of the workers and members we did mass. Thus thanks to them all - each and everyone Whose participation, a community pool has won.

As in the past years, there are a few Hembers of the pool who must say adieu. For they are moving on to new and brighter things which this present day life of ours often brings.

Besides many friends, they also leave in their wake A pool membership of which they did partake. So now other residents are able to sign

Flashback - 1966

Now that summertime is approaching, many of us will be enjoying our neighborhood pool – the Stratford Recreation Association. The Little Hunting Creek Citizens Association Newsletter of March 1969 includes this loving ode to the pool by a member named Jack Bentley.

This poem describes the initial drive to secure the 5.75 acre plot, negotiate the construction contracts, and meet the target of 400 memberships. Opening Day for the pool was August 14, 1966. The poem goes on to describe the ongoing efforts at that time to further develop and improve the facilities. Interestingly, the vision included: a swim team (started in 1968), a dive team (in planning), tennis courts (constructed shortly after), and "swim party dates ... for adults, teens, tots, and their guests". Not so different from today!

The pool has provided enjoyment for countless families over the decades, undergoing many upgrades and improvements over the years. I think the author of this poem should be very proud and happy to see the pool today.

A Reminder About Fireworks





Vehicle Break-Ins and Thefts

Unfortunately, during the last week of June, multiple cars were stolen from their driveways and multiple other vehicles were entered and had their contents stolen. Here's what we know:

- The vehicles did not have their keys inside and were stolen from within driveways.
- Based on camera footage, the thefts took place between 2:45am and 3:15am.
- A group of 5-6 African American males wearing masks and hoods were observed moving together, entering onto several residential properties, and testing car door handles.
- The vehicles stolen were located on Londonderry Rd, Creek Dr, and Bluedale St.
- · At least one of the vehicles was later recovered.
- Credit cards stolen from the vehicles were used several hours later in MD.
- The police have been notified and provided surveillance footage.

It's important everyone remain vigilant.

Update from NVCT

The following letter was sent from Alan Rowsome, Executive Director of the Northern Virginia Conservation Trust (NVCT).

Dear Stratford Landing residents, community, and neighbors,

Northern Virginia Conservation Trust acquired a half-acre property located at 8724 and 8726 Stockton Parkway in December 2022. Since the time of that acquisition, NVCT has solicited and tracked feedback from residents, community, neighbors, and interested parties about ideas and concerns for the property and its use. We received wide-ranging input from many people, and we greatly appreciate everyone's thoughtful input.

As a conservation organization, our first priority is and always has been ecological restoration of the property. To that end, multiple areas of the property have been roped off as "Natural Habitat Areas." These are no-mow zones where the natural seedbank will be allowed to grow and expand. In the fall of 2023, NVCT will work to further enhance these natural areas with supplemental native plantings.

We received a wide variety of thoughts regarding access to the property, including access to the water using the existing dock. Because of a number of concerns that were raised, we are approaching access carefully and incrementally.

NVCT will not be allowing open, public access to Little Hunting Creek using the dock on 8724 Stockton Parkway.

Access and use of the land will be permitted only with explicit permission from NVCT. This will allow us to fully and accurately convey rules and expectations for use of the property, as well as limit the total number of users so the property and the surrounding areas are not overwhelmed. Signage to this effect explaining the process for getting permission to use the property will be installed. This approach also allows us to gauge general interest in the property to inform future management and access decisions.
