Stratford Landing Public Safety Update

I hope everyone is having a safe and productive Spring 2024. In recent meetings with the Fairfax County Police Department (FCPD), it was noted that the most common criminal activity in our area remains episodic vehicle burglary. These are crimes of opportunity that usually occur when a vehicle is left unlocked. So please lock your vehicles and secure your valuables.

The Fairfax Police also stated that one of the best tools for solving crimes in our area are doorbell and outside cameras. They highly suggest installing cameras, such as Ring, Nest, Blink, Arlo, or Eufy. FCPD said that if there were older residents who were not comfortable installing these cameras, they would be happy to come out and assist with installation.

Is there interest in a neighborhood watch? FCPD stated that if there were 10 or more individuals interested in taking part, they would be happy to come out and help set up the program. This program would include a briefing on how to conduct a watch, what you can and cannot do as part of the watch, and the delivery of neighborhood watch signs for posting in the neighborhood which could act as a deterrent for crimes of opportunity, like vehicle theft. Public Safety is looking to set up a women's self-defense seminar in mid-May. This seminar will be available for females ages 13 and older. This seminar will be held at Potomac Kempo – Huntington Dojo. The owner of the dojo, Renshi Geoff Gibbs has over 25 years of self-defense training and will focus on responses to specific situations and threat avoidance. Look for a flyer on the SLCA Facebook page in the next few weeks. We will have 24 spots available for the seminar, and the sign-ups will be on a first come first-serve basis with the priority going to SLCA members.

Flashback – Skating Rinks

Did you know that Stratford Landing used to have its very own skating rinks?! They were located in Stratford Landing Park, behind Stratford Landing Elementary School. They were constructed each year by neighborhood volunteers, including the Teen Club, who monitored and maintained them. Our own civic association, as well as those of Riverside and Waynewood made financial contributions.

The newsletter clipping you see is taken from the December 1970 edition, announcing their near completion in the first year of operation – "the only rink of its kind in the entire county". The next month's newsletter (January 1971) proudly tells us the rinks are in full operation from 3 pm to 8 pm every day. In addition to the rinks themselves, there were benches, lighting, wood stoves, and over the years, pickup hockey games at night.

The September 1974 newsletter says that "a couple of years from now, or possibly even next winter" the County will open "a year 'round ice-skating facility … in the District Park next to Martha Washington Library on Fort Hunt Road" but that "this year, though, we'll go it alone". The new facility mentioned came to be the Mount Vernon Rec Center, which includes an indoor NHL-sized hockey rink. The Rec Center is currently being renovated to include a second rink in addition to other impressive amenities and upgrades.



Osprey Cam

Neighbor Jay Spiegel has upgraded his OspreyCam to a new setup. Anyone is able to observe the nest which is placed on a post in Little Hunting Creek off of Stockton Pkwy. The Axis Q1786-LE camera is mounted high up on the chimney of his home.

Its vantage point is 220 feet from the Osprey nest and elevated 33 feet higher than the nest. The resolution is spectacular and the ospreys are quite active.

Transportation Talk

Right-of-Way at the Camden-Londonderry Intersection.

There have been quite a few complaints about the traffic right-of-way at the Londonderry-Camden Intersection. Some believe there's a 4-Way Stop at that intersection but only Londonderry traffic is required to stop; Camden traffic proceeds through that intersection without stopping.

Motorists and pedestrians alike, agree there should be a 4-Way Stop at the Londonderry-Camden intersection but there's not. While Londonderry traffic is required to stop before crossing the Intersection, Camden traffic is not required to do so. SLCA is aware of instances where motorists believed there was a 4-Way stop at that intersection. In such cases, Londonderry traffic proceeded through the intersection thinking Camden traffic would be stopping. This resulted in near misses and screeching tires. What adds to the confusion is that the intersection just prior (Camden-Wittington) and the intersection just after (Camden-Cavendish) are 4-Way Stops.

Nearly two years ago SLCA requested a 4-Way stop be implemented at the Camden-Londonderry Intersection to alleviate this situation. Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) however denied the request stating that regulations require a minimum distance between 4-Way Stops. The Camden-Londonderry Intersection did not qualify because it's too close to the 4-Way stop at Camden-Cavendish.

If you are travelling on Londonderry and approaching the Camden intersection, please know that Camden Traffic is not required to stop. Most SLCA residents are now familiar with the right-of-way traffic at the Camden-Londonderry Intersection. As a helpful reminder, however, Londonderry Stop Signs have a yellow rectangular sign notifying motorists that "CROSS TRAFFIC DOES NOT STOP".



Fairfax Connector Bus Service Resumes Operations

On February 22nd, 2024 at 9 AM, the Fairfax Connector ceased operations due to a strike by its drivers. Six hundred thirty (630) Fairfax Connector workers walked off the job. The strike continued until March 5th when a tentative agreement was reached. Bus operations resumed Friday March 8th, 2024.

Although the "Connector" is Fairfax County's primary bus service, it is owned and operated by Transdev - a large private sector transportation company. Transdev's bus drivers, however, are unionized and belong to the Amalgamated Transit Union (ATU) Local 689 of the AFL CIO. Their previous contract with Transdev expired in November 2023.

A month prior, October 2023, renewal talks began between Transdev and ATU 689. According to ATU 689, talks did not go well and as a result, the strike occurred. ATU 689 workers said that they needed more competitive wages, retirement security, additional sick leave, and balanced rights between workers and management.

Transdev responded by indicating their offer included a 19.5% pay increase over the next 36 months, 90% health care coverage, 50% dental and vision cost coverage, minimum work hour shifts, 11 paid holidays, 2 additional sick days and a generous 401K plan.

Ultimately, ATU Local 689 and Transdev <u>reached a tentative agreement</u> Tuesday, March 5 following an all-day bargaining session over a new contract. Fairfax County, a stakeholder in this matter, was not directly involved in labor negotiations. Resolve of this strike was between Transdev and the Amalgamated Transit Union (Local) 689. A federal mediator was also involved.

On March 6th, Fairfax County Board of Supervisors Chairman Jeffrey McKay shared the following statement:


"We're pleased that Fairfax Connector service is expected to resume soon for the system's 26,000 customers, on a contract agreement between the Amalgamated Transit Union (ATU) Local 689 and Transdev. Last week I requested the assistance of a federal mediator to help resolve the impasse between Transdev and the ATU. The mutually agreeable solution that resulted from this effort not only respects the exemplary work of the system's drivers and mechanics but ensures that we are moving forward in a fiscally responsible and sustainable manner that benefits our residents."

The Fairfax Connector offers relatively low cost Transportation to the County. Many of us have ridden the 101 Bus that serves routes between Mount Vernon and the Huntington Metro. Our community has been temporarily impacted by having to find alternate transportation to/from work during the walkout. Especially hard hit were families requiring in-home medical care whose providers use the "Connector" to travel to the Mount Vernon area.

SLCA is grateful that a successful negotiation has ended this transportation road-block.
